#### Guide dogs

Do you know anyone who has a guide dog? People who can't see are **blind** and many of them have a guide dog to help them to live **independent** lives. People can teach guide dogs to do these things:

- walk in a straight line in the centre of the **pavement**
- only turn **corners** when they are told to do this
- stop at **kerbs** and wait to be asked to cross the road, or to turn left or right;

- guess **height** and **width** so that their owner does not hit their head or shoulder;
- to not be scared of traffic.

### Pack llamas

Pack llamas carry **heavy objects** in places with mountains, such as South America. They need to eat much less than horses and don't need to drink very often. They are intelligent and are **good at** climbing so they can go places where a **truck** can't go.

### Police horses

Have you ever seen a police officer on a horse? You might have seen one at a **football match** or in the city centre when a **special event** is taking place. Police horses help the police do their job: they let the police see people in **crowds** more easily. Also, people are more likely to talk to and help the police when they see them on a horse. This is why the police have police horses at large events. You might see one the next time you go to a public event.

### Sheep dogs

Many farmers use sheep dogs to **keep their sheep together** and **to stop them getting lost**. They also **protect** the sheep from animals that might try to eat them, such as **wolves**. Sheep dogs are intelligent and can run long distances. It is easy to teach sheep dogs to do what the farmer tells them.

### Glossary

blind = can't see

independent = without help from others

pavement = the path we walk on at the side of the road.

corner = a rounded part of the path where the road turns right or left

kerb = the edge of the pavement

height = how high something is

width = how wide something is

heavy objects = things that weight a lot

be good at = be able to do something well

truck = a small lorry

football match = a game of football that lots of people go to watch

special event = an unusual happening like a festival

crowds = lots of people

keep together = to have in the same place

stop them getting lost = to stop them losing their way

protect = to look after

wolves = wild grey animals that eat animals like sheep

### Teacher's notes

Level and age group: B1/B1+ ages 11-13

Language focus: verb patterns with gerund and infinitive

### Introduction

Tell the children they are going to learn about different animals that help us. Give out the worksheet or display the photos on the board.

### 1 Match the pictures and the sentences.

Tell the children to work in pairs and match the descriptions of the animals to the pictures. Ask them to say why they chose their answers.

#### Answer key:

- 1 This animal carries heavy things. = C (pack llama)
- 2 This animal is the 'eyes' of a person who can't see. = A (guide dog)
- 3 This animal helps the police do their job. = B (police horse)
- 4 This animal helps the farmer with other animals. = D (sheep dog)

### 2 These animals help people. How? Talk with a classmate.

Tell the children to work in pairs and say how the animals help people.

#### Answer key

- 1 A guide dog helps a blind person go out and about.
- 2 A police horse lets the police control large events.
